Dear friend of Reach Beyond,

In Paul's letter to the Romans (15:20), he states that his ambition has always been to preach the Gospel where Christ is not known. For many of Reach Beyond's partners and missionaries, sharing the Good News with people who have never heard is not just an ambition, it is an everyday reality.

It can be challenging to work in areas of the world where there are very few believers and a lot of resistance.

Some of our medical missionaries are serving in places where they are not permitted to publicly share the Gospel, but God is using them to encourage and disciple local believers and build up His Church. These medical teams are demonstrating the Gospel by showing Jesus' love, compassion, and healing to people who are hurting. Our medical missionaries are using their skills to enable pastors and local believers to engage with communities that have long been resistant to the Gospel. By working together, national believers are sharing the Good News of Jesus with people who have never heard it before, and they are becoming followers of Jesus!

Reach Beyond continues to co-labor with local believers across the world to use radio and digital media to plant seeds of the Gospel among unreached people. We offer training that helps partners produce creative programming that better connects with their audiences. We encourage and help our partners find ways they can personally engage with their listeners, including in-person events. Wherever possible, we help our media partners learn to demonstrate the Gospel using things like clean water, community development, and medical ministry.

We've seen that God multiplies the impact when we partner and co-labor with local believers. Each of us is able to use our gifts and talents, share what God has taught us, and learn from each other. We both are then able to pass that knowledge on and empower others who seek to reach their communities.

Thank you for your prayers and partnership to bring the Gospel to places where Christ is not known.

GLOBAL SNAPSHOTS GOD AT WORK AROUND THE WORLD

ASIA PACIFIC Long Time, No See!

For the first time in over three years, Janice was able to visit the Manna Radio Network* team in Southeast Asia, a longtime partner with Reach Beyond. The network consists of over 50 stations, and she was returning to a place she knew well. With travel restrictions lifted, she prepared to teach a weeklong class to 14 students from across the network, the first in-person class since before COVID-19.

During the five-day class, Janice and her local partners taught students the ins and outs of effective radio ministry and self-sustainability. In addition to studying best practices for content creation and audience engagement, students also learned practical business skills, such as mounting effective marketing initiatives, producing commercials, and creating public service announcements. Students especially appreciated the ethics training, a vital component in presenting audiences with a biblical worldview.

Each of the network's stations focuses on reaching local communities, and many are owned by local churches or businessmen. While many of the stations have "Christian" audiences, most listeners have no active faith in Christ. Thanks to interactive class activities, workshops, and a fun, relaxed environment, Janice and her team provided students with the tools they need to reach their communities more effectively with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

NORTH AFRICA/MIDDLE EAST A Beacon of Light on Mediterranean Shores

Aisha* never expected to visit North Africa as a missionary trainee. When she first arrived in Europe, she did not even know Christ, but now, many years later, she had the joy of the Lord in her heart. This trip, a partnership between Reach Beyond and Ishmael's Hope*, was her first opportunity to take the Gospel to people with whom she shared a common language.

Aisha served with James* and Sarah*, Reach Beyond missionaries, and three others on a rare kind of missions trip, one designed specifically for Christians with Middle Eastern backgrounds. During the 10-day trip, the team partnered with a local church, engaging in Arabiclanguage ministry directed toward refugees and asylum seekers. They spent time at the beach, on the streets, at the church, and in homes engaging in pre-evangelism and proclaiming the Good News to those willing to join the conversation.

God also gave the team unique opportunities to minister to displaced people. While meeting with a group of Syrian refugees, they received permission to pray for the young men, giving them a glimpse of what Christian hope and a relationship with Jesus are like. The team also worshipped with and encouraged believers who had left their homelands and settled in North Africa.

Through this trip, God provided Aisha and others with lessons in practical ministry and new avenues to explore for future work.

LATIN AMERICA Climb Aboard to Explore, Connect, Learn, and Serve

In the Peruvian jungle city of Pucallpa, 39 excited participants climbed aboard "El Evangelista." They were preparing to embark on a five-day adventure that would broaden their understanding of God's mission and give them opportunities to serve in jungle communities along the Ucayali River. They were welcomed onboard by an international group of missionaries, pastors, doctors, dentists, volunteers, local guides, and the ship's crew.

Mission Aboard was started by Reach Beyond missionary Américo Saavedra some 15 years ago. He wanted to create a practical cross-cultural missions experience that would impact local communities and inspire and launch the next generation of Peruvian and Latino missionaries into all the world. The annual program is designed to give people the opportunity to really explore missions, connect with missionaries, learn about missions, and serve others. After three consecutive years of canceled trips because of COVID-19, the Mission Aboard team was excited to set sail.

The Mission Aboard group spent their mornings on the boat where experienced missionaries taught sessions including God's passion for missions, the role of missions in transforming people groups, and a variety of other cross-cultural missions topics.

During the afternoons, the participants served in the communities where they taught Bible stories, talked with villagers, played games with children, and shared the Gospel. Some of the group helped assist the medical/ dental team as they treated 479 patients.

The team put together a special program one evening for a local community to give the participants more opportunities to directly engage with the villagers. During the program, participants from each culture shared something that is part of their identity whether it be music, poetry, clothing, or an interesting story. Américo says, "Moments like these allow people to vividly see the best in other people and their cultures and deepen the relationships within the group."

As the boat made its way back to Pucallpa, the team had a time of reflection, evaluation, and testimonies. Participants were excited about how they could encourage missions in their church and take the Gospel to other lands.

For many of the participants, the end of the adventure was the start of a new lifelong journey. One commented, "After this trip, I will never be the same," and another proclaimed, "I want to serve the Lord for the rest of my life!"

Nazira was at the end of her rope. For over two years, her depression frequently kept her bedridden and unable to care for her husband and three young children. Her husband did what he could to support her. When she could not get out of bed, he cooked meals and cleaned the house, something his Muslim peers rarely did for their wives. He helped keep the household running, but even with the children's help, his efforts seemed to barely keep the family functioning. Nazira needed more help than he could provide.

Nazira had explored all available solutions to treat her illness. The mosque could not help her. Local shamans were powerless to heal her. One by one, each possibility had disintegrated before her, and she was getting worse. No one in Nazira's home village of Safak could help her, but that was about to change.

HELP IS ON THE WAY

About ten years ago, Reach Beyond medical missionaries began partnering with Christians in the region to provide healthcare to underserved people in Central Asia. Their efforts initially focused on providing healthcare to those living in and near one major city. They also provided medical training to local residents, opening new doors for local believers to engage in spiritual conversations with those visiting the clinic.

As time passed, God provided more people and resources, and He created new ministry opportunities. Medical missionaries started offering clinics in a few villages outside the city, including some located far away. Each time the small team prepared to visit a community, they worked hard to include and integrate local believers who could bridge the cultural gap between the medical workers and their patients. Each visit allowed

missionaries and local believers to connect with people who had never met a Christian or heard the words of Jesus, people like Nazira.

In the fall of 2021, the team visited the village of Safak for the first time.

HOPE DAWNS IN SAFAK

Like most villages in this part of Central Asia, Safak is a small, dusty town where the smells of tandoor-baked bread and coal smoke intermingle as children play soccer on a makeshift field. The village seemingly grew up from the dust of the earth. Border disputes, job scarcity, and ethnic strife left many people wandering and homeless. Safak's first residents arrived and set up temporary shelters where cinderblock homes now stand. Hardships, trauma, and prejudices have created uncommon levels of distrust and animosity among Safak's 13,000 residents. Poor infrastructure and a significant lack of resources have made life even more difficult. As the village grew, the government could not keep pace, leaving most residents without adequate access to critical services, including healthcare.

Reach Beyond medical missionaries Matthew and Dr. Luke first visited Safak alongside Dr. Claire, a medical ministry partner. They set up a temporary clinic and saw many patients during their visit. The people greatly appreciated the team's work and asked the team to return.

Matthew and Dr. Claire visited again the next week and again the following week. The pattern continued, and the

team grew to include both foreign and local medical workers. Since Safak had no known believers, the team saw their weekly visits as an opportunity to actively demonstrate the practical love of Jesus to this vulnerable community.

MAKING INROADS

Over time, the team expanded their efforts in pursuit of more holistic care through community development efforts. They taught classes designed to tackle epidemic issues, such as poor diet and unemployment. Many villagers began learning how to cook healthy meals, sew, and speak the local trade language.

These classes allowed the team to connect with members of the community, but the greatest breakthroughs started with their medical work. The clinic team began making house visits, building relationships in people's homes and slowly beginning to earn the people's trust.

Alara, a local Christian and former language teacher, soon joined the team. She held a counseling degree and was looking for ways to invest in God's Kingdom. In Central Asia, people see little distinction between the physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual, and Alara's skill set and love for Christ began to open many new doors for spiritual conversations.

As relationships developed and spiritual conversations began to happen more frequently, the local government started to push back. The clinic and counseling sessions were taking place in a government building, and local leaders felt strongly that the spiritual conversations needed to end. The team began to consider that perhaps this project had run its course and maybe it was time to move on to another village. However, even as these discussions were happening, God made it clear that He was not yet finished in Safak.

INEXPRESSIBLE JOY

Nazira's situation continued to deteriorate. With her hope all but gone, she wrestled with thoughts of permanently ending her suffering. Death now seemed like the only way out.

One day, she received a phone call from Alara. She asked Nazira if she would like to visit the clinic, but Nazira was too weak to leave her bed. Still, she saw a glimmer of hope. Nazira knew the clinic team would return soon, and she decided to try and visit the clinic the following week. When the team returned, she mustered up enough strength to visit the clinic.

At the clinic, Nazira saw Dr. Claire who evaluated her condition. She then referred Nazira to Alara for a psychological examination. As she spoke with Nazira, Alara felt prompted to share the Gospel with her. When Alara had a moment, she stepped out of the

exam room and asked two other team members to begin praying for her as she told Nazira about Jesus.

Nazira listened carefully to Alara's words. She had never heard this story before, but without a doubt, she knew it was the truth. Without hesitation, she decided to follow Jesus, and immediately, she was a new woman! Her depression was replaced by inexpressible joy and happiness, and all thoughts of suicide vanished. The four ladies soon began singing and praising God for His great work.

RADIANT NEW SOUL

Within minutes, two men unexpectedly entered the room. One man had worked with the clinic team before but was very anti-Christian, and the other was a village leader. The men told them that all religious activity must stop. They knew the clinic team had many Christians, and it appeared they wanted to prevent anyone in their village from becoming Christians. They were too late. Nazira had already heard the Good News!

Nazira began meeting with the team each week so she could learn more about Jesus and God's Word. Many in the village tried to convince Nazira to turn back, telling her, "Watch out for these people. They are part of a sect." Each time, she replied, "I don't know who they are, but I know I'm a new person. I don't want that to stop, so I'm going to keep meeting with them."

Nazira's radical change dramatically impacted her family. She started playing praise music at home, and her oldest daughter, a young teen, especially enjoyed listening to the music. Nazira's husband was amazed by her change. When villagers would tell him to watch out for the Christian people at the clinic, her husband would answer, "I don't know what they are, but I want them to keep coming. The change in my wife and our relationship is so good because of them." Nazira's mother, a shaman and fortuneteller, saw the complete change in her daughter, and she too began meeting with the team alongside Nazira.

When Ramadan came to a close near the end of April, Nazira and four others in Safak had come to Christ, including Nazira's sister. Like Nazira, she too suffered from ongoing medical issues. She visited the clinic for treatment and encountered Jesus Christ for herself. The clinic team has since partnered with other Christians from the capital city to begin discipling these new believers. The believers in Safak are few and face much opposition, but He who began a good work in them will be faithful to complete it.

HEARING GOD'S CALL

College is demanding enough without adding all the complexities of navigating a worldwide pandemic at the same time. Chloe* and Payton* found themselves in that exact situation. Despite many challenges and roadblocks, they were both driven by their faith and a desire to make a positive impact on the world. They understood the importance of service and action.

As they prayed about and explored ministry opportunities, a Reach Beyond USA missionary was in the process of partnering with their university to co-lead an upcoming missions trip to a refugee camp in Greece. Chloe and Payton both decided that this trip would be a great opportunity to put their desire to serve into action – and they headed off to Greece.

We talked with Chloe and Payton about their experience working in the refugee camp.

As full-time college students, how difficult was it to make time for the Greece trip amidst juggling exams, part-time jobs, and maintaining relationships with family, friends, and your church groups?

• PAYTON: Our Greece trip happened over winter • break, so managing that wasn't too bad even if the added trainings and team meetings did bring some added stress. But the knowledge that those meetings were preparing us to serve the Lord and His people in the most effective way made the meetings a sort of break – and even a highlight – during our hectic school weeks.

• What was your biggest aha moment from your Greece trip? What was your biggest learning experience?

CHLOE: Observing the volunteers on the field that lived and served there faithfully every single day was eye-opening. They gave their lives for the sake of those who were in need spiritually and physically. It was especially encouraging to watch the women in leadership who had a simple obedience to the Lord, who were gentle and meek, and were strong and hard workers. Watching their faith lived out was a testament to me that what the Lord called me to do was not only possible, but it painted a clear picture of what my calling would look like, including the challenges and the triumphs of everyday ministry. The best lesson I learned was that all God truly desired from me was to continue to be faithful to Him.

• PAYTON: Just as much as the Lord provides for an overseas trip – meaning everything from walking out of my front door to the plane finally landing back home – He must also be the one who keeps us present during the trip. I experienced personal conflict and team conflict during my time in Greece, and it was very easy for me to focus on those circumstances and let them distract from the purpose of my trip. However, the Lord was always gently and kindly reminding me that being faithful to Him in all moments is all He asks for. A short term trip can really be a whirlwind, but He desires for us to be present with Him in every moment and not get caught up in all the stressors around us.

Is there anything else you'd like to share?

CHLOE: God brought us overseas in the same way He brought the refugees there under such pressure and tragic circumstances. He is the God of the wanderer, the traveler, the foreigner. It was quite overwhelming to witness the true resilience of the people we met. God showed His heart for the world in that He protected the travelers and allowed them to make it safely to a new place. Hearing the stories of visions and testimonies of miracles from the refugees was the most humbling and awe-inspiring experience we will forever cherish.

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LET THERE DDE LIGHT



As Omari settles down for the night, he looks again at the prized handheld radio sitting on his parents' bedside table. While he listens to the rain pattering on the thatched roof overhead, he remembers the Jesus story he heard earlier and wonders what will happen next. Omari does not know the people who tell the stories, but he loves to listen to them. He and his family are very grateful for Radio Lilanguka (Radio Light), which airs all its programming and music in their heart language. No other radio station does.

Radio is a lifeline for people all across Africa. Traditional radio receivers often bring people together as they listen to the news, sporting events, and other programs of local interest. Village shopkeepers and restaurant owners often play their radios all throughout the day, effectively turning their businesses into gathering places for the local community. Most cell phones in Africa include a built-in FM radio, making radio the most accessible media outlet on the continent.

LIGHT OF LIFE

For many years, Christians have tried to reach Omari's people living in Malawi and neighboring countries, but few have seen much fruit. Evangelistic efforts by Malawian believers have encountered cultural and linguistic differences that make outreach extremely difficult and largely unsuccessful. A small church has existed among Omari's people for many decades, but until recently, growth has been slow.

Local believers and missionaries wondered if radio could be used to effectively share the Gospel with Omari's people, who had been resistant to all other attempts, but they knew nothing about starting or even running a radio station. They contacted Radio Africa Network. The network agreed to help and partnered with Reach Beyond to launch and support the new station.

Starting a Christian radio station can be extremely challenging in many parts of the world. It would take nearly a decade for local believers and like-minded organizations to get all the necessary permissions for Radio Light to go on the air.

Building listenership for a new radio station can be difficult at times, but Radio Light had no such trouble. Many of Omari's people do not speak other languages, including those broadcast on local radio stations. When people heard that the new station would be airing in their own language, they became very excited! Word of the station's existence spread quickly during its first two weeks on the air. Those holding strongly to other religious beliefs were now able to listen to the radio, and they did so eagerly.

TRAINING FOR SUCCESS

The success of any radio station starts by producing programs that engage and meet the needs of the listener. Local believers understand the culture and know how to share the Gospel, but they usually need help in figuring out how to create strong content. They need programs that will effectively engage the non-Christians they are trying to reach. Since Radio Light first launched, Reach Beyond missionaries have provided training and technical support to the team on multiple occasions. This spring, Reach Beyond missionaries, Benjamin and Tess, visited the station to provide them with additional training. The staff and volunteers Benjamin and Tess encountered were a young, energetic bunch, ready to have fun and eager to reach their people with the Gospel. They were also smart and creative.

"The listener interaction, I think, is one of the best things that they do," Benjamin said. Virtually every program includes direct listener feedback, allowing the station to be "the voice of the people," something the team especially values.

Benjamin and Tess invested in the Radio Light team, teaching them new skills and strategies. They spent three days teaching multiple sessions. They covered topics such as scripting, income generation, and effective social media engagement. Benjamin dedicated a session to professional development, something the team found new and exciting. Joseph, another Reach Beyond missionary, taught a virtual session on the principles of journalism. One presenter had never learned about this topic and was very grateful to receive that training.

LEARNING TOGETHER

Even though Benjamin and Tess were there to train, they themselves learned new things from the Radio Light team. They were impressed with the station's adaptability and its Christian radio internship program. They saw many examples of the team's clever and original strategies that keep the station running smoothly.

Tess noted how Radio Light had adapted to the unpredictable nature of life in the region. Unlike traditional radio stations, Radio Light uses a presenter rotation for each program, resulting in a program "roster". If a presenter gets sick or is unable to make it to the studio, another presenter will take his or her place, and the show will continue as usual. This approach removes the burden from individual presenters without disrupting the station's operations or the audience's experience. "That's a very different culture, but I really liked it," Tess said.

Audiences differ from country to country and region to region, and effective radio will adjust to its listeners' needs and interests. Despite having an audience that has been highly resistant to the Gospel, the team has

become very adept at finding creative ways to connect and identify with their listeners. They do an excellent job of adjusting their programming to match the flow of the community's agricultural lifestyle, and while most Malawian Christians enjoy up-tempo music, the station airs slow-tempo Christian music, since it is more in line with their listeners' cultural tastes. Radio Light's programming approach has earned high praise from non-Christian listeners.

TRANSFORMING LIVES

The Radio Light team also uses creative means to broadcast the Gospel to listeners. Every morning, they air 15-minute dramas that address common issues in the local culture. Each skit uses a neutral tone to communicate biblical truths and teachings. Topics focus on common practices and day-to-day issues, such as the wisdom of monogamy over polygamy or honoring one's parents, and audiences love listening to these shows.

Radio Light excels at effective off-air ministries that create opportunities to engage with listeners face-to-face. Mary and Melina, two presenters for the station's women's program, began looking for ways to personally connect with their listeners. They started hosting cooking classes at the station. Women who attend the classes take the recipes home with them and impress their husbands with the new meals. Word spread, and now, each class has 10 to 15 women, giving the team new opportunities to build personal relationships and discuss spiritual matters.

Programming on Radio Light also includes verse-byverse expository Bible teaching. These programs are the cornerstone of the station's ministry and have generated enough interest that Radio Light's team members now lead 10 Bible studies in various villages, each with an average attendance of 15 to 20 people!

Every day, Radio Light proclaims and demonstrates the Good News of Jesus. Even though their audience has historically resisted the Gospel, the authentic message presented and lived out by the station has made it a trusted voice of truth and a beacon of light to the community.

The powerful message of the Gospel is beginning to transform lives. Praise God for how He is at work and using Radio Light to bring people to Himself!

THE NOGAI are a Mongol-Turkic people that live in and around the Caucasus Mountains and claim descent from Nogai Khan, a general of the Golden Horde and the great-great-grandson of Genghis Khan. The Nogai practice Sunni Islam influenced by folk religion. They believe that to be Nogai is to be Muslim. There are only about 20 known Nogai Christians.

Pray that God would raise up men and women of peace to listen to the Gospel. Pray that the Nogai would desire to read the New Testament and explore Jesus' claims. Pray for those who are faithfully translating the Bible into Nogai.

THE TIWA have lived in northeastern India since at least the 17th century. They live in two distinct groups: the Assamesespeaking Plains Tiwa and the Tiwa-speaking Hill Tiwa. The Plains Tiwa practice a form of Hinduism. The Hill Tiwa practice a tribal religion. The Tiwa honor many festivals, including Christmas, but there are very few Christians.

Pray for intense spiritual hunger to drive them to Christ. Pray that God reveals Himself as the one true and just Chief who offers them eternal life with Him.

THE SAHRAWI are North African desert nomads with mixed Berber, Arab, and black African ancestry. Throughout history, the eight Sahrawi tribes often battled for supremacy, but today, their conflict is with non-Sahrawis. Violence has forced many women and children to flee to refugee camps, dividing families. Sahrawis consider themselves pure Sunni Muslims, but they also practice some pre-Islamic beliefs. Pray for peace in Western Sahara.

Pray that the Sahrawi would see Jesus as the Prince of Peace and that they would run to Him for salvation. Pray for ambassadors of Christ to bring the Gospel of Peace. Pray for completion of a Hassaniyya Arabic translation of the Bible.
